Dear Prime Minister,

Re: Election in Zimbabwe

Further to our letter dated January 15, 2002, I am writing to advise you of the Canadian Bar Association's concerns arising from the recent election in Zimbabwe. We urge the government to continue to find solutions, whether through the Commonwealth or otherwise, to ensure respect for human rights, democracy and the rule of law in Zimbabwe.

As an organization of jurists, we are concerned about human rights and the application of the rule of law. The March 14, 2002 preliminary report of the Commonwealth Observer Group points out that the Zimbabwean police failed to investigate reported cases of violence and intimidation, especially against opposition supporters, and enforced the law more harshly against opposition supporters. The Commonwealth Observer Group also notes an "inexplicable" delay in the government complying with a High Court order to extend voting to March 11, 2002. Further, other election observers have revealed that Zimbabwean authorities violated their own election laws by closing polling stations when people were still in line at the time polls closed. All of this suggests a continuing and disturbing lack of respect for democratic rights, human rights and the rule of law.

The Commonwealth Observer Group concluded that "the conditions in Zimbabwe did not adequately allow for a free expression of will by the electors." The report states that "while the actual polling and counting processes were peaceful and the secrecy of the ballot was assured, the Presidential election in Zimbabwe was marred by a high level of politically motivated violence and intimidation, which preceded the poll."

We must do all we can to support those in the Zimbabwean legal community who are seeking to protect the rights of citizens, to uphold the rule of law and to hold the Government of Zimbabwe accountable for actions which adversely affect democracy and the rule of law. In our January 15, 2002 letter, we referred to the CBA's Council's unanimous a resolution supporting the citizens and human rights lawyers of Zimbabwe in their efforts to protect the rights of individuals who

have been affected by the decline in the rule of law. A copy of this resolution is attached for your convenience..

Decline of the Rule of Law in Zimbabwe

WHEREAS the Canadian Bar Association works with the legal profession in Zimbabwe to support the rule of law and to advance public interest law;

WHEREAS the Government of Zimbabwe has put increasing pressure on the courts in Zimbabwe, in an effort to reduce their ability to act independently;

WHEREAS the Canadian Bar Association has been informed of the serious attacks on the rule of law and the independence of the bar and the judiciary in Zimbabwe;

BE IT RESOLVED THAT the Canadian Bar Association state its support to the citizens of Zimbabwe and the legal profession of Zimbabwe who strive for social progress, equality and democracy through adherence to the rule of law and respect for the judiciary, and urge the Government of Canada:

1. to call upon the Government of Zimbabwe to take all necessary steps to honour its commitment to support the rule of law and an independent judiciary and Bar in Zimbabwe; and
2. to support the work of human rights lawyers in Zimbabwe and the Law Society of Zimbabwe in their efforts to
